# **Surveying the new find in Darby Cave** By Nathan Roser

On June 16th (I think) Corey Hackley, Ryan Boyce and I went on a survey trip in Darby Cave. Before getting into the cave we walked around a nearby streambed to look at some sinkholes and insurgences. We found a hole in the middle of the creek that was taking in water. After pulling some debris out of the hole and building a dam to reroute water around it Corey looked in and said it goes and disappears down a waterfall. We decided to save this one for later. We headed over to the entrance of Darby and looked at another insurgence a few hundred feet upstream in Rattle Run. This one is just a swirling pool of water that would be impossible to enter. After this we suited up and began our survey of Darby at the entrance. We got the entrance passage in two 45 foot shots and then headed up the chute to the drop into the rest of the cave. We spent about 5 hours surveying and netted about 400 feet for the day. We cut the survey short so Corey could show us some cool parts of the cave and go check out the insurgence we left behind earlier. After doing some crawling down 45 degree angle chutes and some walking and stooping in horizontal passage we arrived at a passage called the Storm Drain. The passage is a bedrock tube that is hands and knees crawling height for hundreds of feet. It gets the name from it's shape and the acoustics. All in all a very cool passage. After exiting Darby we headed back over the the new insurgence. I really wanted to crawl in this one so I went in feet first due to the entrance being a squeeze with lots of water flowing in. After about 10 feet of

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moving backwards I was able to turn around and crawl on hands and knees. 5 feet later the water plunges down a slope to the right and ends in a mud siphon 15 feet later. I crawled back out and as I bumped the clay ceiling chunks of it fell off. Only 30 feet long but it's a new cave in Maryland and the whole area around it could have something quite large that will be part of Darby Cave.

## Shoveleater (July GVKS weekend)

On Saturday, July 21st I went on a GVKS trip into Shoveleater. After eating breakfast we loaded up and left the field house. There were six of us; Mark, Dwight, Yvonne, Tyler, someone whose name I forgot, and myself. The goal for the day was for one team to work on the dig at Rush'n Rift and another group to do a bolt climb at Pristine. After dropping by the owner's house we headed up the road to the cave. We were expecting to do a lot of tree clearing due to the big storm a few weeks earlier but we were pleasantly surprised to find a large part of the road already cleared. However, we did eventually run into fallen trees and broke out the chainsaws. After working on the road we got to the entrance and suited up. We entered the cave at 11 AM. We didn't wait around for everyone to go in at once since a few folks in front want to go replace a badly worn section of rope at the Ohio Bypass and hammer off the offending rock protrusion that caused the abrasion. After the bypass was rerigged we headed on over to our destinations. I went to Rush'n Rift to dig. We got into the rift at about 1:30 PM and got to work. We spent a grand total of 9 and a half hours digging, enough to make my hands quite sore and destroy my gloves. At some point in the middle of the day the crew from the Pristine climb came by and told us they climbed up about 50 feet to a narrow slot that didn't go very far. They left the cave after this while we kept working. There was a lot of air moving inwards through the rift and we could sporadically hear dripping water in the distance. At 11 PM we began our journey out. Since it was my first time in Shoveleater, Dwight took me on a little detour to see Hellhole Hall and the

Acoustic Persistence Chamber. We got out of the cave at 1 AM after a 14 hour trip.

# **Mammoth Cave – Grand Avenue Tour**By Arthur Hanson Jr

Christal, Kai, Lucas and I made the Mammoth Cave Grand Avenue Tour part of a recent trip through Tennessee and Kentucky. This is the longest tour available in Mammoth and covers approximately 4 miles of cave. Kai pointed out that this is very small compared to the total 360 miles of mapped passage.

We set up camp in the Mammoth Cave National Park campground the evening before our tour. After a brief trip to the visitor center, we drove down to the Green River ferry crossing and set out upriver in our canoe. We made it about 2 miles up the green river past Cave Island to Floating Mill Island. A little exploration yielded a nice selection of fossils – mostly Crinoids and shell imprints. We headed back downstream about 7:30. We watched with delight as Tri-color Bats gorged themselves on insects over the Green River at dusk; often flying within feet of our canoe as they swooped on their prey.

We assembled the next day for our 11:30 tour at pavilion B near the visitor's center. One of our two guides went through the safety briefing and stressed the importance of not bringing potentially contaminated gear into Mammoth. Fortunately, Mammoth has not been contaminated by White Nose. From the Visitor's Center, it was a short bus ride to the Carmichael entrance. From there we descended about 200 steps into the Rocky Mountains where one of our guides gave a demonstration of the lamps used for tours in the 1800s & 1920s. From there we hiked about 1 mile through Cleveland Avenue to the Snowball Room (1 hour). The entire way, Kai expressed his surprise and dismay at the unique sidewalk & handrail 'formations'.

Our lead guide stopped several times to talk about geology and cave formation. Kai did not approve. At our last stop before lunch, after demonstrating

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reverberation due to another passage inches under our feet, she asked if anyone smelled anything unique. One gentleman responded that he smelled something particularly 'stinky'. After a brief pause the guide commented that the smell was the Snowball Room's vegetable soup and that it was, in fact, quite delicious. Someone else in our group of 28 asked if they served hot wings (they don't).

About five minutes later we walked into the Snowball Room. The floor is concrete. There are about 20 picnic tables in two rows. There's also a lunch counter, chips, sandwiches, coffee, soda, a water fountain and his & hers bathrooms complete with hand dryers & lo-flo environmental flush toilets. The soup was actually pretty good.

From the Snowball Room, we travelled through Mary's Vineyard and Boone Avenue, past Thorpe's Pit. Kai had been up front with the lead guide. However, we found him waiting for us near the end of Boone Avenue with a despondent look on his face. He'd gotten in trouble for trying to lead the tour. Apparently the guide was too slow. We slunk towards the back of the group and struck up a conversation with the other guide bringing up the rear. We learned that she was a local Grotto member and an experienced caver. I was thinking that being a ranger at Mammoth was one of the world's coolest jobs until she shared the fact that she never made it to OTR because she always had to work Labor Day weekend.

We stopped on top of Mount McKinely (very large break-down passage) for Mammoth's other set of public restrooms complete with hand dryers and flush toilets. We also talked about more geography and were lectured on the importance of using the 'mandatory' handrails in the upcoming downhill section.

We started off in the lead again – just after the guide this time – as we headed down the impressive breakdown. That didn't last long because Kai got in trouble again for not using the mandatory handrails. We slipped further back in the pack again and met up with Lucas and Christal. While Kai had been

bemoaning the walking path, handrails and lighting, Lucas was desperately trying to suppress his urge to express his boredom. It was getting harder by the minute. He thought it was 'so lame' that we had to stay on the path and took every opportunity to shine the flashlight we had brought down side passages. He was determined to try though because he wanted to earn a promised trip to Dinosaur World in nearby Cave City.

From Mount McKinely, we traveled down through Grand Canyon and Kentucky Avenue. Next we went through the Big Break – the only tight spot on the whole tour. The tour ended at Frozen Niagra, an impressive flowstone formation about 60 feet high. On the way out, we caught a glimpse of Crystal Lake far below the main passage then proceeded out through frozen Niagra entrance to waiting tour bus back to Visitor's Center.

Once back at the Visitor's Center we piled into the car for our trip to Dinosaur World.

Before leaving Mammoth Cave National Park we stopped by Sand Cave to pay our respects. We also made a short stop at Carter Caves State Park to explore the entrance to Laurel Cave.

### P Caves in Pennsylvania

Josh Prusha and I took a quick trip to the P caves in Pennsylvania on August 18th. Since it had been a few years since I had last been there, I got some quick directions from Jon Peterson and remembered, if nothing else, that there seemed to be a plethora of caves in the area and we were bound to find one or two.

We decided to head towards Python and Persistence/Platter first because those were caves I had already visited. We actually stumbled upon Python, and after sliding into the cave, stopped to fill out the registration. Of course, throughout the day, we discovered that none of the registration tubes had anything in them. We took a right and

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headed into the long, narrow, pathway towards the back of the cave, exploring as far as we could before turning back. Once back at the entrance room, we headed down towards the stream and explored around. There was a new, tight crawl that had been dug out for a couple hundred feet that I did not remember from my previous visit. I looked at the sump heading to Monster Dome and saw that the entire path had approximately 4 inches of airspace above the water. We still decided against going through. We did, however, head about 200 – 300 feet downstream until the ceiling of the cave, once again, met water.

After leaving Python, we looked around the woods, following old faint trails for signs of other caves but came up empty handed. We passed sinkhole after sinkhole, but none opened up. I decided to head towards several of the other caves Jon had suggested and ended up finding Woodchuck Pit. I knew the name because a piece of pink flagging had it labeled. We decided to inch down the hole and even rigged a hand-line to descend into the depths of the pit. We spent five minutes exploring the entirety of Woodchuck Pit before heading out to find other targets.

It wasn't long before we came across Perseverance. I recognized the entrance from Jon's description. This is another short cave full of tight, narrow, exhausting passage. A small junction room leads you to think that more caving possibilities exist, but after searching each direction, climbing and contorting, we had once again explored the depths of another cave. Perseverance did mark the doubling of Josh's cave count, as he had only been in three wild caves prior to this trip.

With the luck we had at finding caves so readily, we decided to search out one more and eventually landed at Buchanan cave. The cave entrance was another one perfectly described by Jon. We were excited to be in a cave that we could stand and walk in without touching any walls. It was a good cave to end our day on and probably the most fun. We discovered a nice little slide that led down towards a stream but proved difficult to climb back up. Once

again, we explored every possible lead that we could find and left the cave fairly happy with our efforts.

Total cave count for the day was four. All of them were brand new to Josh and three were brand new to me. Not bad for a Saturday.

Corey and I had a short 14 hour trip in Memorial Day in Germany Valley this past weekend with Chris Coates and Nikki Fox. We split into two survey teams. Corey and I got about 140' of virgin cave mapped in 14 stations with going cave. It was pretty nasty all in all but up ahead looked like it might improve. We quit because we were wet and cold. If I return it will probably warrant as PVC suit to keep from becoming hypothermic in the wet slime. I think Chris and Nikki also got a little over a hundred feet on their lead. It was Corey's first time down any of the drops in MDC and I thought he did real well.

We went in the historic entrance and did a loop to the Little Lechuguilla passage to see the gypsum chandeliers. After this we went down the cable ladder drops and worked our way to the stream level and then heading back out of the cave through this route. Nothing too interesting happened in the cave but while we were asking permission from the owner before going in, some other group's SUV bumped into the owner's mailbox. The box got bent up a little but the SUV took a bit more damage.

Sunday(9/2) at OTR I went to Left Tit Pit with the Rockeaters (Brian Barton and Mark Whittermore) and Abbe Hamilton from SUOC. We went down the drop and several thousand feet into the cave before turning around. Going back out we discovered the solid looking rock we rigged to was actually just loosely sitting on top of a mud layer. After the first person up noticed this we re-rigged the rope to a rock projection further back and everyone else climbed up. We decided the best course of action would be to send the big death boulder down the pit so no one else would make a similar mistake or risk it falling while on rope. We easily pried it loose but it got wedged at the top of

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the pit and wouldn't go down. We spent about 45 minutes kicking it, throwing rocks at it, and prying it with a tire iron before we finally gave up and left the cave. As of now it's still sitting at the top of the drop so it will take some more powerful tools to get rid of it.

Saturday September 8th I led a group of SUOC cavers to McFail's Cave up in New York. There were five of us total in the group. There was a thunderstorm in the forecast but little rain and the weather had been dry all summer so the risk of high water was low. After rigging the Ack's Shack entrance we headed over to Hall's Hole which is usually a 67 foot waterfall. This time the drop was completely dry. After everyone was in we headed down the main passage for over a mile until one of our group got tired and we began heading out.

When we reached the bottom of Hall's Hole there was still no waterfall. The first ones out reported it was raining on the surface but the stream still was not flowing. By the time we all got out there were a few drop going over the edge but not waterfall. After de-rigging and heading out it became apparent there was a lot of wind. The Ack's Shack entrance had two trees in it. I had to get on rope and head down into the sinkhole to pull the trees out to de-rig the drop. After we all got back to the car we headed over into Cobleskill, NY for a pizza dinner.
