




#### **TAG Spring Break**

My Spring Break started off with a 9 hour drive from Morgantown to Kimball Tennessee on a Friday night. We were camping at a little site called "Cavers Paradise" which came with a rope course, a "sauna", "hot tub", and most importantly heated showers. The car I was in arrived at Cavers Paradise at about 2 in the morning. Everyone quickly set up camp and headed off to bed, most of us feeling like kids on Christmas Eve.

We woke up around 8 the next morning and made our way back into town. We decided to stop for breakfast at the local Waffle House, which would become our breakfast location for the rest of the trip. After a short breakfast and Walmart run, we headed to Cedar Ridge Crystal Cave. This was a non-vertical cave, but was highly decorated. The cave is located right beside Interstate 24. It was blown open during construction of the interstate and then had to be closed because locals were taking formations out of the cave to sell at local gas stations. The gate was a concrete wall with small metal door that could be unlocked with a key. Once you crawl through the entrance you have to make your way through some easier crawling and stooping. After this you arrive in what is obviously the main attraction. The whole roof of the main room is coated in soda straws. The room had to be at least 50 feet wide and 70 feet long. After we were done gawking at the crystal white soda straws we moved our way to the back of this room. In the back of the room there are columns rimstone pools and decorated flowstone. The formations covered almost all free space in the cave, and white helictites were growing off some of the columns. After spending a considerable amount of time in the cave, we headed back to Caver's Paradise and spent the rest of the day lounging around and preparing for the vertical

drops we had to stomach tomorrow.

For Day #2 the itinerary entailed Cagle's Chasm and South Pittsburg Pit. First we went to Waffle House to meet up with Alan Cressler, who is known for his knowledge of the TAG

region. He would be joining us for the day. For the first half of the day I went to Cagle's Chasm (187 feet); this was to be my first "TAG Cave." Once we arrived at the pit, Ryan asked if anyone wanted to rig up "Jeep Side" (110 feet) which is a drop that leads to part of Cagle's and has a keyhole that can be rigged to drop into the main pit. I went along with Ryan to help rig that pit, which at the time we were told would only be 70 feet! Luckily we rigged with a 200 foot rope so it did not make a difference. I rappelled down the first few feet which puts you on top of a large flowstone formation. As I work my way down the flowstone, I look over the ledge expecting to see a 50 or 60 foot free drop, and I got almost double that. Needless to say I was fairly startled but dropped it anyway. After taking a glance through the Jeep Side Keyhole to the main pit, I ascended out of Jeep Side and walked over to Cagle's Chasm. I dropped into the 187 feet almost stunned by how it felt to be free hanging for so long. After looking around there for a few minutes, everyone climbed out, I bounced Jeep Side one more time, and then headed to South Pittsburg

Pit.





We decided to rig the 160 foot drop of Pittsburg Pitt with two ropes, one on each side. Being the ambitious caver I am, I made sure to

bounce both ropes. I went down one side and quickly climbed out of it and then rappelled down the other rope. From here I waited around with Ryan and Wayne for dusk, because Ryan really wanted to get a picture of the pit at dusk under a clear sky and the conditions were just right. I climbed 2/3 of the way up one of the ropes while Wayne went 1/3 of the way up the other. We both awkwardly held flashbulbs and Ryan was able to pull off a few shots. After that we ascended out of the pit in darkness, which was a strange feeling for me. I started climbing out of the pit in almost full light and crested the lip at night. From here we headed back to camp. This night was fairly cold so we found ourselves huddled into the




sauna for a few hours before braving the night.

For Day #3 we would also bounce two pits. The first cave we went to was Stephen's Gap Cave. The drop from top to bottom is 150 feet, but we were doing a shorter drop of 120, which lands you on "The Pedestal." In this cave there is a walk-in entrance and a pit entrance, which makes it very photo friendly. It is also great because you can rappel and then walk out instead of ascending out. I made sure to climb out at least once to say that I did it. I rappelled the pit 3 times. It is truly a beautiful pit because you rappel so close to two thundering waterfalls. To me, this was the best cave we did during Spring Break. While at Stephen's Gap about half a mile away is a small cave called Pipe Side. It is a nice 60 foot drop that was lightly decorated and a few of us bounced it just to say that we did.

From Stephen's Gap we moved on to Neversink. Neversink Pit is 162 foot pit that had several small waterfalls all concentrated in one area. There is very little cave beyond the pit so it was a quick trip in and out. Of course, after another long day most of the group was tired so we went back to camp to lounge around the fire and in the sauna. This night would turn out to be the coldest night of the trip.



For Day #4 there was only one cave on our list: Valhalla. Valhalla is a 220 foot pit entrance

from the **short** side. I was one of the first few down into the cave. Myself along with a few others decided to go to a room called "Mega" Dome" which is a 200 foot high dome with a rope bolt rigged to the top. Valhalla has a minor maze system and it can be very hard to get to where you want to go even if you know the general direction. It took us about 90 minutes to find our way to the Mega Dome. Once there a select few of us climbed to the top of the 200 feet. Once you are at the top you have to change over to your rack. It did not matter that I had practiced change-overs dozens of times in practice, my heart was still in my throat while I was doing it. I was the last person to climb up the Mega Dome so from there we headed out. We took a guick stop at the waterfall room which has a massive in cave waterfall that comes out of the top of a 160 foot dome. From there we hiked the 2.5 miles out of the cave preserve back to our cars in the dark. Once we got back to camp, I fired up the makeshift hot tub (a barrel like pool with a semi submerged potbelly stove) to get the water a little warm. After spending an hour or so in the water I headed to

Day #5 would be my last day in cave. We would be going to Natural Well Cave, which is in Monte Sano State Park outside of Huntsville. After jumping through the park's hurdles and permission forms, we marched to the cave. The pit was surrounded by a rusty chain link fence that none of us would trust any amount of weight to be put on it. There was a short concrete wall that was put there for us to drape our ropes over. Natural Well is a 190 foot pit, but after doing 220 the day before it felt a little short (never thought I would say that about 190 feet.) We did not spend long in the cave because the park demanded that could not stay past dusk. After de-rigging we all headed to "Ole Hickory BBQ" outside of Huntsville and treated ourselves to a full southern BBQ. We all got back to camp and enjoyed the new

warm weather that had moved in.

This was the end of my trip. The next day I left at about noon. Once back in Morgantown, I drove back home to Martinsburg. With all this time on the road it gave me a lot of time to think about how amazing this trip really was. I was able to get into some world-class caves. I had amazing friends with me to take pictures with, and help me enjoy my expierence. Even though I saw these amazing caves in Tennessee and Alabama, I still, and always will, be impartial to the caves of West Virginia.

#### **Another Trip Report**

The weekend of April 8th started while I was waiting for Ryan to pick me up for the ride down to WVACS. Using my time wisely I made sure to look at the weather forecast for the weekend. Since it was April I was expecting nothing short of wonderful spring weather. Well, I ended up with snow and 20 degree weather. We made our way down to WVACS Friday and got their late in the evening. I set up my hammock while it was flurrying. Woke up next late the next morning and we didn't get into Bone-Norman until 12:30, which I guess makes us "Gentleman Cavers." Once we got into the cave we were maybe 50 feet in and there was a wonderful group of formations (Pic #1). We hung around that area for a bit looking at 2 considerably large salamanders.



From there we moved into the waterfall area, which you could hear from the entrance room. The waterfall had a considerable amount of water coming over and was next to deafening (Pic #2).



After enjoying the waterfall we moved on through a mix of borehole/stream passage. The deepest water was waist deep, and was a little chilly and very fast moving. Most of the trip was spent in this passageway. We got to a point where we could start seeing some obvious turn-offs.

The leader of the group started us all up the flowstone to the side passage. Once on top of the heavily travelled flowstone, you have to step down a few feet. I walked a few feet and had another 4 foot wall to step over. It then dawned on me that I was just standing in a very large, dry rimstone pool. There were 4 of these very large rimstone pools, the largest that I think I have ever seen. After a few more short crawls and stoops, the group ended up in "Caramel Corner." It was a passageway that had an impressive amount of flowstone and speleothems (Pic #3).



The rimstone pools in this area were crystal clear and were next to impossible to stop looking at (Pic #4 and #5). This was our turn around point.





On the trip back through we took a small trip to the West Virginia Room, which had a few totem poles and a nice flowstone shield in the back (Pic #6).



We exited the cave at around 4, and we were more than cold, considering most of us were near-soaked through to our base layers. The next day we decided to do two short trips into the Higginbotham's Cave System. The first trip was in to Higginbotham's #2, which we only went in to the entrance room to look at the flowstone and formations in the back (Pic #7).




After maybe 30 minutes we exited and went to Higginbotham's #4. It was so cold outside that none of us hesitated to dive into the 80 foot, cobbled belly crawl, we just wanted the 55 degree warmth that the cave could provide. After the crawlway there was some bear crawling through a stream and sand. That section was short and we ended up in some large stream passage. It was very straight and flat. We covered the same distance in that passage in 30 minutes that took us 90 minutes in Bone-Norman. The water never got above your knees. Ryan wanted to stop at "A Special Place" which was a nicely decorated section of this stream passage. (Pic #8). Since we had a pretty early callout time, we turned around there after several pictures and exited the cave at 1:30.



There was one more goal for the trip, and that was to go see the Falls of Hill Creek in the Monongahela National Forest. The park was covered in 6 inches

of snow, but the roads were clear. There are 3 waterfalls there, we took time to look at Middle Falls and Lower Falls (Pic #9). The lip on Lower Falls looks perfect for a nice rappel and we all swore to come back and bounce the 30 - 40 foot drop. This was the capstone on our trip and we all headed back to Morgantown from there. Despite it being a pretty cold weekend, I was able to go to three amazing places that I most certainly want to visit again.
