

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

Shreve Howell Pit

In the last week in June I was able to get some caving done. After searching for Shreve-Howell Pit on a previous day for 8 hours, we came back more prepared and determined to find the cave. We did in fact find the cave and we were a little embarrassed to find out that the cave was only 50 feet away from one of the places we stopped to look for the cave. After the excitement had waned, we rigged the pit and I was the first to drop into it. Shreve-Howell is about a 120 foot pit that has next to no cave at

the bottom. The entrance to the pit is a mud funnel that gets down to about 3 feet around. Once you get past that "tight" spot the pit opens up to probably 60 feet wide. It is a very fun pit to drop, and would love to go back again. Most of it is free hanging.

After taking a handful of pictures we were done in the cave. My friend Edgar and I had decided to have an ascending race out of the cave (we had rigged two ropes). After I was about halfway up it was clear Ed was going slow and when I called down to him he told me that the harness was not being kind to him. The race was called off due to a technicality. It just gives us a reason to go back.


The day after that we had plans to go do a 14 hour trip into Friars Hole to the Rubber Chicken Highway. Since the area was still dealing with flooding, and there was a flash flood warning we decided to nix the trip. Instead we headed over to Maxwellton Cave.

It was my first time in the cave so I was having a blast. We had plans to go to Thunder Dome. On our way there we went through the Heaven Passage which did live up to its lofty name. There was helictites all over, a good portion of them were covered in completely white calcite. You would think it would get old after a few feet, but no, it's still very pretty even after a several hundred feet.

Once we got to Cove Creek we started to see some pretty eerie signs of flooding. One of the most travelled areas of the cave had no footprints, they all had been covered in fresh mud. Then we walked to the actual creek we saw that it was very very low. Members of our group theorized that the low water was caused by a plug somewhere up stream. Once we realized that, quickly exited the cave. We left the cave at almost twice the speed we entered. After we surfaced, I was done for the day and headed back to the Eastern Panhandle.





This story takes place 38 years ago when I got started into caving. The year was 1978 and I was 32 years old. I had never been caving before. Of course I had been in plenty of commercial caves and loved every minute of it. But as far as caving, well, "I never lost anything in a cave so there was no reason to go caving!" Even as a child whenever I saw a sinkhole or a small cave entrance I was really scared to go into the unknown.

In June of 1978 my family and my brother-in law Chuck Stanley and his wife were traveling through WV for vacation. We would do that sort of thing. We would pick out an area whether it be WV or TN and we would travel to places that we could find on a map. We never had a plan but we would just look at a map (you could get one at almost any gas

station for free) and pick out something and try to find it.

At this time we saw something on the map that peaked our interest. It was a dot that said 'Sinks of Gandy'. We had no idea what it was but we were going to find it! We were all over the mountain. I believe that we were on almost every back road in the area and still had no idea what we were looking for. We happened to see a ranger and we stopped and asked him where the Sinks of Gandy was. He proceeded to give us directions but we missed something along the way. We still couldn't find it!

On a long lost back road we came upon an elderly farm woman getting her mail and we stopped and asked her if she knew where the Sinks of Gandy was. She said, "Yes, you are actually close to it." She proceeded to tell us where to go and each turn to make. She then said that there was a gate in the fence. We were to park just up the road from the fence on the curve. We then were to walk to the gate, climb over it and follow the old road down over the long hill. She said that Gandy Creek flowed into a big hole in the hill! Well we had to see that! We were really excited. We had never seen a big hole with water flowing into it!

Sure enough when we got to the bottom of the hill there was a beautiful creek flowing lazily into a huge hole in the side of the hill! This really excited us! In all there was Chuck, his wife Kim, Paulette, and 2 of my boys, Jamey (8) and Derek (4). Chuck and I literally ran back to the vehicles to get flashlights! We shared the entrance with a herd of cattle who were just trying to keep cool in the summer hot sun.

We waded in and went until you could not see daylight. Since we only had 2 flash lights we turned around. But it was too late! Chuck & I had been 'bit by the bat'!

We headed home after vacation but all we could talk about was going back with flashlights and seeing the 'unknown'! We made plans to come back on Labor Day weekend. Chuck was in the Marines at the time so he took leave and when Labor Day arrived we headed back to WV to camp. We were

experienced outdoorsman so we knew that we needed plenty of light, snacks, something to protect us from danger, and a means of communication.

Arriving at the parking site Chuck, my oldest son Jamey (8 yrs old), and I geared up for the trip into the unknown. The 3 of us each had a flashlight, hunting knives on our side, and Chuck carried my 40 channel walky-talky. We each had on a baseball cap, shorts, no shirt, no socks, and tennis shoes. But yet we were smart! We knew that when batteries went dead we would need more batteries so we each had our pockets full of batteries and a couple of candy bars. In case we ran into trouble we told Paulette & Kim to turn on their CB radios and we would contact them with the 40 channel walky-talky. WE WERE READY!

We headed down to the entrance and headed into the 'black unknown'! This was exciting! After all we saw water, rocks, and holes everywhere! It was really spooky! At times we were wading in water up to our waist. Occasionally we would find a deeper hole but we would try to find an easier way. After all my son was only 8! Of course we had no idea how far this dark hole went but we were determined to see it to the end!

We had no idea at the time but looking back now, about 1/2 way through we ran into a group that was traveling slower than we were. They looked like miners to us. They had coveralls, boots, packs, hard hats, and head lamps. Chuck & I kept talking to each other saying things like, "Maybe we ought to follow them. They looked like the might actually know what they were doing!" Of course they kept turning around and staring at us. They were probably thinking, "Boy if that ain't an accident waiting to happen!"

We continued to follow them until we came to a pool of water blocking out path. Several of the group waded into the pool and came back saying that there had to be another way. Well Chuck and I were determined to find the way on before they did. We started looking around. We found a small hole that led to somewhat of a chimney. It was muddy but we were determined! Alas it didn't go. When we came back out the group was gone! My youngest

son started to cry and said that, "We were lost!" We assured him that we were not lost and if we couldn't find the way on we could always retrace our steps back to the original opening.

We continued to look around because we were sure that the group didn't go back. Finally I found scrape marks over a mud bank. When I slip/slid over the bank I followed the passage and came out into a room where I smelled fresh air. I went back to get Chuck and Jamey. We went to the room and looked for the way out. Chuck found the passage leading to the dry entrance.

We were celebrating, slapping hands, and cleaning off in the creek. Now we had one more problem! We had no idea where we were! Chuck handed me the walky-talky and I started shouting for Paulette. Finally she answered. Of course they had been worried because it had been several hours since they had heard from us. I told her to blow the horn on the truck to give us a direction to go. Whenever we thought we were lost I just told her to blow the horn and it kept getting closer. Finally we saw the trucks up on the hill. WE WERE SAVED!

Now we really were 'bit by the bat'! We couldn't wait to go back. The next year on Memorial Day we planned another 'excursion' into the unknown but this time we were going to include Chuck's baby brother Junior and his best friend Donnie! After all we wanted to share our excitement with good friends!

Now that is another story!!!!!!!!!!!!
