#### **Endless Caverns**

I have always heard about trips to Endless Caverns over the years, but I never really checked into going on one of the trips. Well in February 2020 I heard about a light bulb changing trip that was going to happen on the 24th of March, but that date just did not work for me. I had to many things going on and I thought I would ask Jerry Bowen if he could get a trip together for me and a few members of RASS. Now I have known Jerry for over twenty years. Think the first time I met him was when I was leading a trip to Marshalls Cave during a VAR and as we were going to the lower level to where the stream is my pack exploded. Back then I was using a carbide lamp and I had just change carbide the spent carbide leaked gas in the pack which acted like a balloon and it did explode. Poor pack never was the same after that. Any way Jerry said he would check to see about a trip in the first part of March. Several days later he e-mailed me and said if the 14th of March was good date? The trip was set.




I asked Jerry how difficult Endless Caverns wild section was and he said it has some exposure, and a 45-degree angle climb. But it was a pretty nice cave with a lot of formations.

The person who was going to guide us through the cave was the Mike Stewart. I set out to get a group together

and only three members from RASS were able to go. So I opened it up other people. So the group going was Mike Stewart (the guide and manager of Endless Caverns), Jerry Bowen (the trip leader, Tri-State), Richie Ellison (RASS President), Mat Gerard (RASS member), Tom Griffin (Tri-State), Red Shock (Independent), Miller Berge (Independent), Christopher Berge (independent), Earle Berge (Independent), Rosemary Mallonee (Independent), Maleshver Singh (Independent), and Eric Berge (RASS and Tri-State). The Group was set, and we were meeting at the parking lot of the caverns at 10am. We all converged on the parking lot and the cave milling began. You ask what is cave milling? That where everyone shows up, we walk around a talk to each other for a while since most of us have not seen each other for several years.

Gear was passed out, everybody got suited up and as were suiting up I noticed that Tom was bringing a seat



harness and quick action safety. I asked him about it, and he said that the 45 degree climb if you let go only thing that will stop you is the bottom and he always liked having one. Well everybody was suited up and we all entered the main entrance to Endless Caverns and had to sign some waivers and a group photo was taken. That way we know we would have everybody when we left.

Mike lead the way and I started asking him about Endless and he said the caverns itself is seven miles long and we had to go through the commercial part to get the entrance to the wild section. If you have never been to Endless Caverns, it is well worth the trip just to see the commercial section. It has a lot of beautiful

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formations, and Mike pointed out the different drops that went to the different levels and down to the stream bed and he mentioned the cave this year was very dry. He said the formations are usually damp and the formations are dripping. But this year everything was dry. Mike took us about a half of mile and stopped. He said there it is, pointing to a small crawl.

We all started into the cave by way of the crawl and had to stop and take some phots of different people pushing their way through the opening when Singh went through I had to keep encouraging him to keep going, he is a rather large young man, he made it after a few grunts and groans. I should tell you this was his first cave trip and I was not sure how he would do. It was also Miller Berge's first cave trip, but he is like a string bean, tall and thin. Rosemary had been caving before, but I found out later this was her first off-the-path cave trip. She and her mother spent a lot of time in one cave repairing different formations, but her mother always kept her close.

Mike told me that the squeeze is the worst part and he always takes people through just to make sure he has real cavers with him and if anyone decided to back out that was the place to do it. That was a nice test. We did a lot of crawling and stooping, and we finally got to the 45 degree climb down. Jerry went down and I think I went second so I could get a few photographs of people. A few people were leery of the drop, but I yelled up to them that there is nothing wrong with coming down on your butt. Once you commit yourself over the edge you had to finish up.


We made to one section where Mike had a small pyramid made from mud squares he had made. Each mud square was for each trip he had made to the wild section. Course we have the other weird caver stuff that cavers like to make while here are in cave. So from the number of blocks Mike has been in the section over 40 times. What it must be like to have a cave you can explore whenever you want to. We stopped here for a few minutes.

As we went along, we went by a large room that was called the Blackburn Room. Mike said there was another way back to the climb up and that we would be going back that way. The next stop was a good size

room which turned out to be the turn-around point after we rested for a few minutes. Mike explained that the cave is still being mapped and explored and just a



few feet from where we were is a break down room which has a lot of promises for new passageways. After about a 15-minute rest we started heading out and we split up into two groups at this point. Mike took a group down into the Blackburn Room where there was a small hole you went through which opened up in a very low



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crawl. To get into the Blackburn room you slip on your butt against the far-right wall trying to control your descent. There were no ropes of hand line in this area. I stayed with the group that went back around the Blackburn Room. We went around several pits and did several climb downs and we all met at the junction to start our climb out. Jerry went up the 45-degree climb, and I followed him up. The climb up is a lot different from going down for the simple reason sitting on your butt doesn't work going up. You had to be standing or on your knees. I did both till I got to a place where there was solid footing. I noticed that Singh and Rosemary got into the harness that Tom had brought with the safeties. They came right up the climb and in no time, they were over the top. I can tell you one thing though the climb will boost your self-confidence because you are very much exposed, but once at the top you have to watch out for the pits so you don't fall in them. There were a lot of bridges you had to use to get across the pits. Once everybody made it to the top of the drop, we made it to a room that has a lot of different formations. To get here you had to go sideways down a short drop that was actually the top of some flow stone. I took the opportunity to take a lot of photos. It turns out there are three ways out of the wild section. One way is the way we came in, another way was the section we were at which involved getting on your knees and scooting around on the top of flow stone while holding on to the different hand holds. Oh, by the way if you let go you end up dropping 35 to 40 feet. I kind of looked at that and said what is the third way. That involved a really nice crawl and at the end of the crawl you are back in the commercial section of the cave called fairy land. Well me and several other decide to do the crawl which involved having to climb back up the flow stone drop. There were just a few foot holds, and you had to wedge yourself in and up. We all made it, and there was the crawl all lit up with light bulbs. In the commercial section they light this passage up and it looks like a fairy land, but not with us come out of it. It was a nice long crawl and thank goodness we had knee pads. Mike lead us back out and on the way out we stopped at the dance hall section of the cave and he put on the light show and explained that in the twenties and thirties they would have dances and the location was somewhat of speak easy during probation. We made it

back to the two large door that lead into the cave where another group photo was taken. We all had a great time exploring the wild section of Endless Caverns. This is a wonderful cave and I want to thank Mike Stewart for leading a wonderful trip. I really want to thank Jerry Bowen for setting up the trip for us.
